

Simple present:


I write a letter.

Present perfect:

I have written a letter.



- Express actions that started sometime in the past and completed at an unspecified time (possibly present)
 - There has been a war in Israel.
- Express actions that started in the past and are continuing at the present time
 - I have had a cold for two weeks.



- Can't be used with specific time: yesterday, last week, that day etc.
- We can limit the time: in the last year, this week, this month, so far, up to now, etc.
 - I have seen that movie six times in the last month.

last year (specific time) ≠ in the last year (time range)

Present Perfect - Uses

Experience

- I have been to France.
- I have seen that movie before.
- Have you ever met him?
- No, I have not met him.

Present Perfect - Uses


- Change over time
 - You have grown since the last time I saw you.
 - My English has improved since I moved to Australia.
- Accomplishments individual or general
 - Man has walked on the Moon.
 - Our son has learned how to read.


Present Perfect - Uses

- An uncompleted action you are expecting
 - James has not finished his homework yet.
 - Susan hasn't mastered Japanese, but she can communicate.


- Multiple actions at different times
 - The army has attacked that city five times.
 - We have had many problems while working on this project

Present Perfect - Positive







Present Perfect - Positive




- Examples:
 - I have seen that movie.
 - You have eaten mine.

Present Perfect - Negative









- Examples:
 - She has not been to Rome.
 - We have not played football.

Present Perfect - Questions



- Examples:
 - Have you finished reading that book?
 - Have they stopped the protest?

Present Perfect – Adverb Placement

- Place adverbs before the verb
- Adverbs: always, only, never, ever, still, just, etc.
 - You have only seen that movie one time.
 - Have you **only** seen that movie one time?

Present Perfect - Contractions

- Contraction is optional
- Often done when speaking:

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I have → I've
She has → She's
We have → We've
...
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- Careful: It's finished.
 - It is finished.
 - It has finished.
 - Well... usually clear from the context.

Present Perfect - Examples


- Positive sentences:
 - I/see/movie/twenty times: I have seen that movie twenty times.
 - People/travel/to the moon: People have traveled to the Moon.
- Negative sentences:
 - People/not travel/to Mars: People have not traveled to Mars.
 - Nobody/ever/climb/that mountain: Nobody has ever climbed that mountain.
- Questions:
 - You/read/the book/yet: Have you read the book yet?
 - She/eat/that cake: Has she eaten that cake?

Past Perfect


- Simple past:
 - I wrote a letter.
- Past perfect:
 - I had written a letter.

Past Perfect



- Express actions completed before a certain time in the past
 - You had studied English before you moved to New York.
- Express duration before certain time in the past
 - We had had that car for ten years before it broke down.

Past Perfect – Specific Time



- Can be used with specific time: yesterday, last week, that day etc.
- If "before" or "after" are used can also use simple past
 - She had visited her Japanese relatives once in 1993 before she moved in with them in 1996.
 - She visited her Japanese relatives once in 1993 before she moved in with them in 1996.


Past Perfect - Specific Time




- If past action/event not referring to specific time, past perfect must be used.
 - She never saw a bear before she moved to Alaska. *Incorrect*
 - She had never seen a bear before she moved to Alaska. Correct

Past Perfect - Positive

Subject + HAVE (Auxiliary verb) + Main verb (past participle)




Past Perfect - Positive




- I had finished my work.
- You had stopped before me.
- John had completed that assignment.

Past Perfect - Negative










- She had not gone to school.
- We had not left.
- They had not eaten the apples.

Past Perfect - Questions





Past Perfect - Questions



- Examples:
 - Had you arrived?
 - Had they eaten dinner?

Past Perfect – Adverb Placement

- Place adverbs before the verb
- Adverbs: always, only, never, ever, still, just, etc.
 - You had previously studied English before you moved to New York.
 - Had you **previously** studied English before you moved to New York?

Past Perfect - Contractions

- Contraction is optional
- Often done when speaking:

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I had → I'd
She had → She'd
We had → We'd
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. . .

Past Perfect - Examples


- I had never seen such a beautiful beach before I went to Kauai.
- I did not have any money because I had lost my wallet.
- Tony knew Istanbul so well because he had visited the city several times.
- Had Susan ever studied Thai before she moved to Thailand?
- She only understood the movie because she had read the book.
- Kristine had never been to an opera before last night.
- We were not able to get a hotel room because we had not booked in advance.
- A: Had you ever visited the U.S. before your trip in 2006?
 B: Yes, I had been to the U.S. once before.
- By the time Alex finished his studies, he had been in London for over eight years.
- They felt bad about selling the house because they had owned it for more than forty years.

Simple future:


He will write a letter.

Future perfect:

He will have written a letter.





- Express actions completed before a certain time in the future
 - By next November, I will have received my promotion.
- Express duration before certain time in the future
 - I will have been in London for six months by the time I leave.




- Can't begin with time expressions: when, while, before, after, by the time, as soon as, if, unless, etc. Use present perfect instead.
 - I am going to see a movie when I will have finished my homework. *Incorrect*
 - I am going to see a movie when I have finished my homework. Correct





Future Perfect - Positive




- Examples:
 - I will have finished by noon.
 - You will have forgotten me by then.

Future Perfect - Negative








- Examples:







- Examples:

 - Will they have received it?

Future Perfect – "going to have"





Future Perfect – "going to have"



- You are going to have perfected your English by the time you come back from the U.S.
- Are you going to have perfected your English by the time you come back from the U.S.?
- You are not going to have perfected your English by the time you come back from the U.S.

Future Perfect - Examples

- By the time he gets home, she is going to have cleaned the entire house.
- I am not going to have finished this test by 3 o'clock.
- Will she have learned enough Chinese to communicate before she *moves* to Beijing?
- Sam is probably going to have completed the proposal by the time he *leaves* this afternoon.
- By the time I finish this course, I will have taken ten tests.
- How many countries are you going to have visited by the time you turn 50?
- By Monday, Susan is going to have had my book for a week.

 He will have been writing a letter.

Present Perfect - Examples

- I have seen that movie twenty times.
- I think I have met him once before.
- There have been many earthquakes in California.
- People have traveled to the Moon.
- People have not traveled to Mars.
- Have you read the book yet?
- Nobody has ever climbed that mountain.
- A: Has there ever been a war in the United States?
 B: Yes, there has been a war in the United States.
