Prepositions

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Preposition

- Preposition: Describes relationship between words
 - Example: "at", "in", "of", "for" etc.

- Problem: prepositions have the same context
 - "at" Vs. "in" Vs. "on"
 - "for" Vs. "since"

Time

- at- for specific times
 - I will meet you at 10 o'clock.
- on- for days and dates
 - On Monday, you will get your Home-work.
- In- for nonspecific times during a day, a month, a season and a year.
 - I will study for the exam in the evening.

Time- special cases

- Special idioms:
 - "At night" not "in the night".
- Pay attention:
 - I will meet you on Charismas day.
 - I love to go shopping at Christmas time.

Place

We have **at**, **in**, **on**. Which one should we use?

Place- "at"

- Rule 1: specific addresses or avenue.
 - I will meet you at 89, Haim Levanon st.
- Rule 2: specific buildings:
 - I will meet you at the bus station.
- Rule 3: places on a page:
 - At the bottom of the page.

Place- "at" (cont)

- Rule 4: groups of people
 - At the front of the class
- Rule 5: someone is at an event
 - Tom is at the party

Place- "at" (cont)

- Rule 6: someone's home
 - I will meet you at my home.
- Rule 7: places where the events happens
 - The meeting took place at the headquarters.
- Rule 8: corner of a street
 - Meet me at the corner of Haim Levanon
 Street and Kakal Street.

Place-"in"

- Rule 1: big places with spaces.
 - I will meet you in the park.
- Rule 2: bodies of water
 - The bottle is in the sea.
- Rule 3: lines
 - I am in the line for the shopping.

Place-"in"

- Rule 4: Countries and large town
 - I live in Israel
- Rule 5: Inside places
 - My key is in the car.
- Rule 6: corner of a room.
 - My pen located in the corner of my room.

Place- "on"

- Rule 1: surface
 - I have a stain on my shirt
- Rule 2: directions
 - On your left you can see a window.
- Rule 3: names of streets
 - I am living on Haim Levanon street.
- Rule 4: small islands
 - I was on the Cayman Islands

Place- "on"

- Rule 4: small islands
 - I was on the Cayman Islands
- Rule 5: special idioms
 - "On the river"
 - "On the coast"
 - "**On** a road"

Context matter

- Please meet me at my car (referenced the car as a point object)
- I lost my key in my car (referenced the as big place)

Movement

- "to"- express movement toward a place
 - I am going to the university
- Special cases: home, downtown, uptown, inside, outside, downstairs, upstairs.
 - I went home.

Time- "since" Vs "for"

- "for"- when we measure time
 - I was in the university for 10 days
- "since"- from a specific date
 - Will this winter be the coldest **since** the 1980s?

Prepositions at ends of sentences

- Use when the sentence doesn't work without the preposition
 - Who's the present for?
 - Who's the present?
- Use it only if the meaning is affected.
 - Where are you?
 - Where are you at?
